


PETER VARDY'S RE GCSE CONFERENCE

YEAR 9 STUDENT PUBLISHED IN KIDSPIRIT



We are delighted to share that Seanmiguel I (Year 9) has had his writing published in KidSpirit — an international, youth-led online magazine and community where young people explore “life’s big questions” through writing, art and conversation.

Seanmiguel’s piece, “Think Community, Think Relationships” (published 13 January 2026), reflects thoughtfully on relationships between younger and older generations. Drawing on his experiences in London, he explores where wisdom is preserved and passed on, highlighting the role of community spaces, particularly faith communities, in bringing generations together through shared activity, traditions, volunteering and outreach.

KidSpirit is a nonprofit, ad-free, youth-created magazine and community for 11–17-year-olds, designed to help young people engage openly and respectfully with big ethical, philosophical and social questions and to amplify youth voice through publication and dialogue.

FOR ONE DAY ONLY: OWN TRAINERS DAY!

On Wednesday the 4th of February 2026, for one day only, students are invited to wear trainers to school in return for a £1 donation. This fundraising event is being organised by a group of Year 12 Business students, who are keen to support the Salesian charity work, helping street children in Nigeria.



On the day, students will be greeted at the gate by sixth form students and staff, who will:

- Check that the trainers are suitable (ie appropriate with no graphic design. As a guide, wear trainers that would be allowed for a PE lesson)
- Collect £1 from students choosing to wear trainers.
- Check that students are wearing their school uniform, it is only trainers

For those students arriving in PE kit because they have PE in Period 1 and 2, they will need to pay £1 or show that they have brought their school shoes in their bag. If you choose not to partake in this fundraising event, normal uniform rules apply. Anyone wearing trainers without donating £1 will be sent to reflection.

As a Salesian school, we are part of the Salesian Family across the world. That means we're connected to schools, parishes and communities in many countries — all working to live out Don Bosco's mission: supporting young people, especially those who need it most.

One important part of this worldwide family is the Salesian Missions, who help communities around the world with things like education, safe spaces for young people, food, healthcare and training.



This year, we want to support the mission work happening in Nigeria. We'll be sharing ways you can get involved and help make a real difference — even from here at SJBC.

You will have received a letter from the school this week about our approach to mobile phones. We are writing again to share the wider national context and to thank you for your continued support.

The Education Secretary, **BrIDGET PHILLIPSON**, has recently reinforced the government's position that schools should be **phone-free environments** throughout the school day, so that children can learn without the distraction of screens.

As you know, **SJBC has held this line for a long time**. That is why we use **secure Yondr pouches**, so that phones are kept safely away during the day. This removes pressure and distraction, and helps students to focus on learning and relationships.

We know that being off screens during the school day helps young people to:

- **Concentrate for longer** and learn more effectively
- Experience **fewer interruptions** in lessons
- Develop **social confidence** through face-to-face conversation
- Avoid unhealthy habits such as constant checking and compulsive use


We also recognise that high levels of screen and social media use outside school can affect wellbeing. That's why we encourage families to reflect on healthy boundaries at home, particularly for younger children.

A community approach: Screen-Free Childhood / Smartphone Free Childhood

We are encouraging our whole school community, parents, carers, and even younger siblings, to consider joining a **Screen-Free Childhood pledge**. You may find the UK [**Smartphone Free Childhood**](#) campaign helpful, including its Parent Pact and practical resources for families who want to delay smartphones and build healthier habits together.

We believe children thrive when they **spend less time on screens** and more time **talking, reading, playing, and engaging with the world around them**.

Christopher Lamb is CNN's Vatican correspondent, where he reports closely on the papacy of Leo XIV and religious affairs stories for the network's platforms. He covered the funeral of Pope Francis and the 2025 conclave for CNN, and before his current role worked at The Tablet, the Catholic weekly, for 15 years. In 2020, he wrote a book on the Francis pontificate, *The Outsider*, and his book on Pope Leo, *American Hope*, will be published at the end of March 2026. He is based between the London and Rome bureaux and is a member of the Sacred Heart parish, Battersea.



The Rev'd Erin Clark is an American writer based in London and is the parish priest of St Mary's Battersea. Her essays have been published in literary and theological journals and *The Book of Queer Prophets*. She is the author of *Sacred Pavement*, and her poetry collections include *Whom Sea Left Behind* and *There's No Pluto in This Suite*.



Fr David O'Malley SDB has long experience in the classroom and in chaplaincy. He has studied and written extensively on the Salesian dimension of education in school and in youth ministry, including *Christian Leadership in Education* and *A Young Adult's Guide to Life*. David coordinates the Salesian Schools team and network.
