BOSCO DISCOVERY TALK S - AN AFTERNOON OF LEGAL INSIGHT WITH DR AVIS WHYTE



What an incredible afternoon we had on 14th May as part of our Bosco Discovery Talks series!





Dr Whyte also explored the power of law to create social change, sharing insights from her co-edited book The Long Walk to Equality. Her passionate advocacy for justice and her ability to make complex legal ideas accessible left a lasting impression on students and staff alike. Dr Avis Whyte, Public Law and Tort Lecturer at the University of Westminster, captivated students from Year 12 with her thoughtprovoking presentation on the everyday relevance of law.

Students were fully engaged as Dr Whyte broke down the key elements of tort law—duty of care, breach, and causation—and illustrated them using real-life, relatable examples. From environmental laws that govern the air we breathe, to the consumer and privacy laws that come into play the moment we unlock our phones—every part of daily life is shaped by legal frameworks.

Safeguarding Awareness week SAFEGUARDING IS A PRIORITY AT SJBC

What is safeguarding?

Safeguarding ensures that every child regardless of their age, disability, gender reassignment, race, religion or belief, sex, or sexual orientation, has a right to equal protection from harm. It's the steps that people take to protect children and vulnerable people from harm.



Examples of safeguarding concerns to look out for:



Physical

A group of children pushing or hitting a smaller child when an adult isn't looking.



Emotional

A crying child running towards their parent who responds in a harsh manner using inappropriate language.



Sexual

A teenage girl walking home being catcalled and harassed, or being touched without consent.



Neglect

A child wearing the same dirty clothes every day and stealing food from other children.



How can you help?

If you ever see anything happen to a child that makes you feel uncomfortable, please let your safeguarding lead / person know. You're are not causing problems - you could save a child from unnecessary harm. Any one of these things might not mean anything, but if your safeguarding lead / person isn't told, then they can't help.

Social media safeguarding concerns

With children spending more and more time online it's important that parents and carers understand the risks associated with social media platforms.





with new people which brings with it a risk of connecting with people who are seeking to take advantage of young people and potentially groom them. There's also the possibility of 'catfishing', where people create fake profiles to take advantage of other users.

Cyberbullying Many of these platforms allow users to send private messages which can be harmful. Often the anonymity of being online means people send messages or make comments they wouldn't say in person. There has also been a rise in people's content being uploaded without their consent. **Over-sharing** A lot of these platforms encourage people to share every aspect of their lives, including personal information. Many apps also have location sharing which allows other users to see where you've been, and even where you live. Instagram, for example, encourages use of the location finder when sharing photos and videos.

Inappropriate content It can be easy for inappropriate content to be shared on social media. Snapchat, for example, has become an app for sexting and sharing intimate images due to the ability for photos and videos to disappear after they're viewed.
