


BLACK HISTORY MONTH FOUNDER VISIT

This week, St John Bosco College had the immense privilege of hosting Akyaaba Addai-Sebo, the founder of Black History Month in the UK. Akyaaba, a Ghanaian-born activist and community leader, first introduced Black History Month to Britain in 1987 while working for the Greater London Council. His vision was to create a time each year for people of all backgrounds to reflect on our shared history, recognise the contributions of Black people, and celebrate the beauty of diversity.



During his visit, Akyaaba spoke passionately to Years 10, 12, 13 and 7 about why Black History Month continues to matter — as an opportunity to take stock of our lives and societies, and to remember that every person is made by God and beautiful. He encouraged students to see diversity as a blessing and reminded them that they are the hope for the future, the generation who will shape a better and more compassionate world.





Our Year 7 students were especially animated and thoughtful in their engagement, with many excellent questions. The morning closed with a short interview conducted by Stevie (Year 7), which will be featured in this week's Bosco Newsflash.

It was an inspiring and affirming visit — a true celebration of RUAH in action.

Our annual Year 8 Religious Education trip to Hampton Court Palace, organised by Fr Andrew and the RE department, took place on a beautifully sunny day and proved both enriching and enjoyable.





The workshop was intense but engaging, and students relished the chance to explore the palace and its gardens — a wonderful day of history and reflection.



Students deepened their understanding of King Henry VIII's reign, exploring his relationships with his wives, his conflict with the Pope, and the complex politics of the English Reformation.

The guide offered a thought-provoking insight — suggesting that although Henry broke with Rome, he may have remained Catholic at heart, as shown by his final wish for Masses to be said for his soul.

latest Bosco Discovery Our Talk featured Fraser Nelson. former Editor of The Spectator and a respected columnist for The Times. With his trademark clarity and warmth, Fraser spoke to our sixth form students about a wide range of themes — from journalism, politics and social media to AI, online safety, and employability skills.



He discussed the importance of resilience and open-mindedness, especially when facing criticism or opposing views, and encouraged students to develop the skills that will help them thrive in an ever-changing world.



One of his key messages was one of optimism: he reminded students that being a young person in a London school in 2025 is one of the best positions to be in.

London's schools are now among the highestperforming in the country, and the city offers unparalleled opportunities for young people to shape their futures.

Students asked thoughtful and challenging questions, engaging fully with the discussion, a wonderful example of intellectual curiosity and confidence in action.

It was another inspiring session in our Bosco Discovery Talk series, broadening horizons and reminding our young people that the future is bright and full of possibility.

THE FUTURE OF CREATIVITY WITH AI



Two week's ago our Bosco Discovery Talk was delivered by a team from the Royal College of Art, who explored how Artificial Intelligence is transforming creativity.



They shared exciting insights into how RCA students are learning to design realistic avatars, give them voices, and use AI tools to imagine new forms of digital identity. The speakers also challenged common fears about AI, showing how it can be a force for good, helping people express themselves and collaborate in creative new ways.

WHAT DOES THE GOVERNING BODY DO?

60verning Bodies play a vital supporting and strategic role in the effective planning and decision making of the school. They are responsible for different aspects of the school such as Finances, Premises, Staffing and Curriculum.

WHO CAN BE A PARENT GOVERNOR?

Any person who has responsibility for a child on roll at the school.



HOW MUCH TIME DOES IT TAKE?



The full governing body meets once a term. Meetings take approximately two hours. Governors also attend a committee meeting once a term and at least one monitoring visit during the school day.

TRAINING FOR NEW GOVERNORS

New governors receive induction training explaining the role and responsibilities of governors. There is a designated helpline, website, newsletter and training courses which keeps you informed. Your fellow governors will also support you in your new role.

WHAT QUALIFICATIONS DO I NEED?

Parent governors do not need formal qualifications and need not be experts in the field of education. What they do need is an interest in the school and in the welfare of our children and the time and willingness to get involved.
