





He carried our heavy burdens, a gift so vast.












EXPLORING MEDIEVAL JAPAN IN YEAR 7

This term, Year 7 have been immersed in a fascinating History topic: medieval Japan. Pupils have been learning about the powerful shogun, the disciplined and honour-bound samurai warriors, and the significant — though often underrepresented — roles of women in Japanese society.

To enrich their understanding, students took a creative approach by designing traditional Japanese kimonos. Each design incorporated clan symbols that reflected status and identity, much like those used in historical Japan. As part of their cross-curricular learning, pupils also wrote their own haiku poems — short, traditional Japanese verses that capture nature, emotion, and reflection in just three lines.
