The school have state of the art facilities that can be used upon request to host such talk, workshops, discussions and performances. The school will also make available AV and other specialist equipment to support provider presentations. This will all be discussed and agreed in advance of the visit with the VFC or a member of the Careers team.

Providers are welcome to leave a copy of their prospectus or other relevant course literature at the Careers Resource Centre, which is managed by the school librarian. The Resource Centre is available to all students at lunch time, break time and afterschool.

Impartial Careers Adviser:

Ms R Ennin is contracted to provide impartial careers advice to all students. She has over 25 years' experience of helping and supporting educational providers to meet their statutory responsibility for securing access to independent and impartial careers guidance. She has worked in a variety of settings providing careers education information, advice and guidance.

Ms Ennin will conduct one to one career guidance interviews with Year 11,12 and 13 students throughout the academic year and deliver various workshops and assemblies (Y7-13). This will cover traditional and non-traditional career path explorations, UCAS, student finance, CVs, interview skills, apprenticeship routes and employment opportunities.
